Bovey Tracey Primary School Report



SUMMER TERM activities are starting to 'hot up' for the children of Bovey Tracey Primary School. In May, we were delighted to

welcome members of the Town

Council for the formal unveiling of the Heritage Trail mosaics that Class 7 pupils helped to design and make. The presentation to the school of copies of two of the mosaics was a wonderful surprise. These will be proudly displayed on either side of the main entrance.

The youngest children in the Reception Year are enjoying a series of day visits to Forest School at Heatree. Pond dipping, building fires, making dens for 'Safety Fox', toasting marshmallows and becoming 'Nature Detectives' are just some of the outdoor learning opportunities for the children to engage in. Meanwhile, children from all classes are making full use of the exciting new 'outdoor classroom' on the school field. Thanks to the hard work of a group of volunteers led by governor, Tim Frayling, the field now boasts a shaded outdoor seating area, accessed by a disabled friendly path.

Swimming sessions at Bovey Pool have started and will run throughout the term for Years 1 to 6, along with a host of other sporting events. Our warmest congratulations already go to the Year 3/4 and the Year 5/6 cross country teams, who won their respective titles at the School Sports Partnership competition which involved 250 children from 14 local schools. The Y5/6 cycling team also gave an inspired team performance to take the bronze medal at the prestigious Devon Games, held at Haldon Forest Park, and are now ranked 3rd in the whole of Devon.

Children in Classes 4, 5 and 6 spent a very busy day at Brixham to kick start their 'Smuggling' topic, whilst Classes 7, 8F and 8W benefitted enormously from guided walks along the river and railway line through the expert eyes of Fred Hutt, from the Dartmoor National Park. Classes 2 and 3 are looking forward to spending a day at Buckland Abbey and we hope that the weather will allow all children and their parents to enjoy Sport's Days towards the end of the term.

Prior to preparing to move on to their secondary education, our Year 6 pupils have a forthcoming residential weekend visit to look forward to at Skern Lodge, in North Devon, where a hectic programme of activities is planned, including rafting, caving and an assault course.

The PTA continue to work very hard on the school's behalf and we hope that members of the community will come along to support their final event of the year – a sports festival at the Recreation Ground on 14^{th} July.

Town Council News Update

BOVEY TRACEY Town Council's (BTTC) Recreation, Parks & Property Committee met on Monday 3rd June, at which a number of important decisions and updates on projects were taken. The first matter related to the possible future use of the Community Land adjacent to the Le Molay Littry Way. The Town Council, at the meeting, decided to allocate the site for the development of a new school with some community facilities. This decision was taken after taking into account the recent summary report of the public consultation undertaken last autumn, where parishioners' preferences for the use of this land were to develop it for a new school with associated community facilities. The second matter related to the Old Thatched Inn (OTI). As reported on the website on 17th May 2013, BTTC had been negotiating with Teignbridge District Council (TDC) about removing the Repairs Notice on the OTI. TDC informed the Town Council on 30th May 2013 that TDC has now agreed to remove the Repairs Notice. Because of this, BTTC has now reapplied to English Heritage (EH) for de-listing the OTI. It is important to remind everyone that the site cannot be cleared or redeveloped until the position about the listed status of the site is resolved, and until planning permission is As previously mentioned, BTTC granted. appreciates many residents are frustrated that there seems to be no action to redevelop the site. but these things can take a very long time to resolve and this is no exception. The Town Council is working hard to get the best result for the town and the lifting of the Repairs Notice is another step along the way.

The final important matter, which was discussed at length at the meeting, related to the proposed skate park in Mill Marsh Park. At the meeting the Town Council confirmed the budget for the design and installation of the skate park is to be set at £75,000. The majority of this funding will be from Section 106 monies, which are provided by developers of new homes in the Parish, and which can be used to provide new, or improve existing recreational and play facilities in the Parish. Now the budget has been approved and with on-going involvement of the young people the design of the skate park and work on deciding its location in Mill Marsh Park will continue throughout the summer. The Town Council is also considering options to provide a similar facility for Heathfield. The Town Council will continue to provide regular updates on all these projects as they progress.

Bovey Community Care

SOME OF you may have seen posters around town advertising Bovey Community Care, and asked yourself what it is all about. It is a brandnew charity, set up to serve the areas of Bovey Tracey and environs. The intention is to provide a service for those who caring need companionship, or help with simple everyday tasks such as shopping. It came about as Bovey Tracey had been identified as an area where there was an unmet need for such support. The Riverside Surgery Befrienders had done what it could in the past, but the demands just to provide surgery and hospital transport have now reached the point at which it no longer has the spare capacity to do more.

Setting up such an entity has required a significant amount of work because of the need to put in place policies to safeguard both users and volunteers. We have secured a grant from the Big Lottery Fund as well as financial support from other local organisations. A major step forward has been the appointment of a coordinator, to liaise with the various agencies that may refer clients.
